The Duty of a Sacristan

In Rathdrum, Idaho, Masses are offered daily by our priests here at the *City of Mary*. The daily weekday Mass is at 7:00 at the seminary. Father Benedict offers it on most days, but Father Philip offers this Mass on Mondays. The priest that is not offering the public Mass has a private Mass at the church, with one of the seminarians serving.

In some parishes there is a sacristan. I would like to explain the duties of a sacristan according as I have learned here at the City of Mary. Every quarter of the school year a different head sacristan is assigned, along with two assistant sacristans. For the Second Quarter Father chose me as the head sacristan, along with Joseph and my brother William as assistant sacristans.

The head sacristan has many privileges and duties that I would like to make known to you. His duties are the following: assigning servers to serve Mass, setting up vestments the night before and then putting them away after Mass, preparing and then taking down after Mass, and seeing to it that the sacristy is well cleaned. The role of an assistant sacristan is to help the head sacristan and do whatever is assigned by him. I made up a method, which is that I assign one of my assistant sacristans to set up vestments every other night with me.

Whoever sets up vestments also sets up for Mass the next morning. The two assistant sacristans usually pitch in to put away the missal, cruets and whatever is left after Mass. While they are doing that I assist the priest in the sacristy by putting away the vestments. One of the assistant sacristans is also assigned to fill the holy water fonts so that the parishioners may sign themselves in the form of the cross when entering the house of God.

A good sacristan should be known as a slave of Our Lord Jesus Christ. A sacristan has the privilege to prepare for the coming of Our Lord into our hearts at Holy Communion. I think that is one of the most awesome things a person can do. I think that there should be a sacristan in every parish ready to prepare for the Mass, the most beneficial sacrifice offered daily to Almighty God.
